

Potential I-55 Improvements at Airport Road and at IL 126/Essington Road Public Meeting #2 Summary

<u>Overview</u>

The study area for potential interchange improvements along I-55 extends from the US Route 30 interchange to the Weber Road interchange, a distance of approximately 6 miles. Currently, the only access within the study corridor limits is an eastbound entrance and westbound exit at IL Route 126. The study area includes portions of Romeoville, Bolingbrook, Plainfield and unincorporated Will County, Illinois. The Weber Road interchange is subject to a separate study. Prior studies have identified a potential need for access improvements along I-55 that will improve safety, relieve traffic congestion, improve mobility within the surrounding regional area and promote economic development and job growth. This current study will evaluate potential alternative interchange locations. The current interim conditions for I-55 at the study location are comprised of a 6 lane section with a narrow median shoulder. If a build option is selected for design it will include a 6 lane section with a standard median shoulder.

Identification of Stakeholders

This project has been designated as one that will utilize the principals of Context Sensitive Solutions (CSS) as part of a robust public involvement process. CSS is a collaborative approach to engaging as many stakeholders as possible to develop a project that will best fit into its surroundings using a flexible and creative approach in planning and design to provide cost effective solutions. A project stakeholder is anyone that is affected by the project and has a stake in its outcome. Stakeholders are identified as residents and owners of property within the study area, users of I-55, Weber Road, IL 126, Airport Road and the surrounding roadway network, local businesses, elected officials and local agencies and the general public. The stakeholders will provide feedback on the needs for, and concerns about, the potential improvements along I-55. The project team will consider this information when making planning and design decisions.

The identification of stakeholders was done through a combination of desktop searches and input from local community leaders. Stakeholders were categorized by specific area of interest such as regional planning, transit and transportation agencies, Chambers of Commerce, business/economic development, civic and activist groups, county, municipal and elected officials, legislators, libraries, media, school and park districts, property owners, public safety and utility agency providers. The initial list contained approximately 386 stakeholders.

New stakeholders will be added to the initial stakeholder list throughout the project. All stakeholders expressing interest in the project will continue to be added to the project mailing list and will be able to participate in the process through various public outreach opportunities.

The project study team including the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) and the Villages of Romeoville, Bolingbrook and Plainfield are conducting a Phase I Engineering Study for potential improvements along I-55 at Airport Road and at Illinois Route 126/Essington Road. The study area includes I-55 from Weber Road to US Route 30 in Will County.

The purpose of the meeting will be to provide an update on the study process, present the draft Problem Statement and Purpose and Need, exhibit the initial range of alternatives, discuss the alternative evaluation process and obtain stakeholder feedback. Interested persons may visit anytime between 4:00 and 7:00 p.m. Attendees will have the opportunity to watch an audio-visual presentation, review exhibits, comment on the current and future needs and conditions along the project corridor and meet with IDOT and study team members on a one-on-one basis.

Public Awareness Meeting #2 Summary

The second public meeting for the Potential I-55 Improvements Phase I Study was held on Thursday, June 21, 2012 at the Plainfield Village Hall, 24401 W. Lockport Street, Plainfield, Illinois from 4:00 to 7:00 PM. The meeting was an open house format with a continuous PowerPoint presentation, exhibit boards for review, and a large scale aerial of the study area. Meeting attendees were encouraged to view the current 12 alternatives and leave their feedback. **133 people** signed in at the meeting.

The public comment period after the meeting was open until July 9, 2012. A total of **46 comment forms and 0 additional alternatives to consider** were submitted at the meeting. Another **23 comment forms and 1 additional alternative** were emailed or mailed in. Comments covered a variety of topics with the most predominant themes including:

- Both support and opposition expressed for a possible interchange improvements at Airport Road, IL 126/Essington and 143rd Street.
- Concern over increased traffic near 135th and Essington because of already heavy traffic, the proximity of several schools, neighborhoods and overall safety to the area.
- Concerns were expressed about negative impacts to natural areas.
- Concerns over the impact of a possible interchange to the environment, including air, noise and water pollution, wetland impact, and negative effects to the cultural environment
- The effect on property values was questioned
